As Historic Environment Director, she has strategic responsibility for policy development and advocacy, research and practice across archaeology, historic buildings, landscapes, parks and gardens. Ingrid is also the Trust's strategic lead for Land Use Planning, in which capacity she oversees planning policy and national projects relating to major infrastructure such as HS2, and chairs the NT's Planning and Major Infrastructure Forum. The Heritage Risk Barometer

How can the heritage sector adapt and thrive in a digital age?

This report was developed with an advisory panel made up of leading heritage experts and identifies both the risks and potential opportunities for the use of technology. To support the findings, Ecclesiastical also conducted a survey of 102 senior leaders working in UK heritage organisations in January/February 2020 and added a further 500 for additional research in September 2020, to look at the impact of COVID-19.

The report covers some of the key concerns in the heritage sector and gives some useful best practice examples of the different uses of technology –from risk management to visitor engagement. Funding, increasing costs and maintenance are the top three concerns in the research, with a number of other themes highlighting the need for the industry to adapt. <u>Find out more here.</u>

Roadmap for Business Resilience

This work helps organisations develop a recovery plan to navigate the 'new norm'. This includes good governance and using a risk-based approach, which means organisations are better prepared for whatever the future may hold. COVID-19 has exposed new risks. From social distancing to uncertain customer demand, a risk management approach will help organisations manage these new risks and support planning and nextsteps. Meanwhile significant pre-pandemic risks haven't gone away. This work supports organisations in reassessing strategic risks, as it's likely these will have changed or increased. <u>Read the full report here.</u>
